### 64TH GRAND MOSCOW REGATTA 2025, RUSSIA

The Karachi Boat Club represented Pakistan at the 64th Grand Moscow Regatta, held from June 5th to 7th, 2025, on the Moscow River in Russia. The regatta is one of the biggest international rowing events

that brought together over 1,300 athletes from 11 countries, including Pakistan.

Across four days, nearly 500 races were held. The Karachi Boat Club team included 11 rowers, eight men and three women, who competed in different boat classes such as Single Scull, Double Scull, Quad Scull, and Coxless Fours. The team flew out on June 3 after completing two months of focused training to prepare for the event.

### WORLD ROWING VIRTUAL INDOOR SPRINTS 2025

The Karachi Boat Club proudly participated in the World Rowing Virtual Indoor Sprints, a global competition where each athlete rowed 1000 meters on the ergometer. A total of 46 enthusiastic members represented the club, including 27 male and 19 female rowers. The club delivered an outstanding performance, with several participants placing in the global top 10.

Notably, Ali Imran secured 2nd place in the Junior Men Under-12 category, and Iman Sheikh also earned 2nd place in the Junior Women 17-18 category.

This event highlighted the growing talent and commitment of KBC members, whose dedication to indoor rowing has raised the club's profile on the international stage. Since its inception in 2021, the School Outreach Programme (SOP) has been transforming the lives of underprivileged children through rowing. Every year, the programme grows stronger, with

students from Kiran Foundation and Ida Rieu College for the Blind and Deaf showing remarkable progress.

This year marks a major milestone for Ida Rieu's rowing journey. Due to their impressive achievements, a pontoon has been installed exclusively for them, allowing their students to safely access the water. This is a groundbreaking step, as it enables visually impaired athletes to train directly on the water rather than being limited to land exercises. The introduction of the pontoon reflects SOP's commitment to inclusivity and equal opportunities in sports.

To further support this transition, students from Kiran Foundation and Ida Rieu have also begun swimming lessons. Learning to swim is an essential skill that enhances their safety, builds confidence, and prepares them for open-water training. For many of these children, this is their first exposure to swimming, making it a transformative experience that extends beyond rowing.

At the forefront of these initiatives is Naveen Asad, the project head of SOP. Under her leadership, the programme has expanded beyond rowing, offering essential life skills, fostering teamwork, and instilling resilience in its participants.

As SOP continues to grow, the vision remains clear—to provide more opportunities, better resources, and a platform for these young athletes to shine. The journey of these students is a testament to determination, inclusion, and the power of sports. With each stroke they take, they are proving that barriers can be broken and that the future of rowing is brighter and more inclusive than ever.

### KRC LEARN TO ROW - MASTERS PROGRAM 2.0

Joining the Learn-To-Row program at Karachi Boat Club marked my first formal step into rowing, and truthfully, into any competitive sport since my school days. Held from April 8th to May 17th, the six-week programme consisted of 18 structured sessions designed specifically for absolute beginners aged 27 and above. This batch brought together 12 participants, spanning a wide age range from 27 to 53, which added diversity and depth to the experience.

What stood out to me was how thoughtfully the camp was designed. From our early days on stable octuples to progressing onto quads, the gradual shift in boat types gave us confidence and allowed for safe, skill-based learning. The rotation between multiple coaches - Asif, Sadaf, Wajeeha, and Hamas meant we were constantly exposed to different techniques and perspectives. Each coach brought their own blend of discipline, patience, and encouragement, which kept the learning dynamic and inclusive. The coxswains, especially Vaneeza and Hooria, played an invaluable role. Beyond steering, they offered real-time guidance correcting our timing, motivating us mid-row, and helping build the synct haf's so critical on water. Even the khalasis added to our learning journey.

Their keen eyes and timely pointers at the pontoon helped me understand rhythm and balance in ways I hadn't considered before.

By our 10th session, we were given the opportunity to participate in the Masters Regata alongside seasoned rowers from the club. For someone who couldn't mount his oars properly just a few weeks earlier, being part of a real regatta was both overwhelming and exhilarating. I made my fair share of rookie mistakes, but the encouragement from fellow rowers, coaches, and coxswains turned it into a celebration of progress rather than a test of perfection.

### **KBC COACHING WORKSHOP II 2025**

On Saturday, 24th May 2025, we had the chance to attend a much-needed rigging workshop, conducted by Mariam Kanchwala and Maryam Meraj along side Wajeeha Khan and Head Coach Asghar Ali. This was one of the most insightful experiences I've had in a while. Like many of us, I came in with only a vague idea of how boat rigging worked. I'd always relied on others or just guessed my

way through. This workshop was a game-changer.

Rigging isn't just about following a formula, it's also about understanding what works best for your own body and comfort on the boat.

We started with the basic standards of rigging— and how each adjustment affects boat performance. After going over the fundamentals, we got hands-on practice. We tried out different setups and learned how to adjust things like gate angles, footrest, soread and soan on individual

needs. It was empowering to finally understand the technicalites of the boat, and how to make small changes that can greatly improve balance and control. This workshop didn't just teach us how to rig a boat—it gave us confidence for when we go on the water. I walked away feeling more prepared, more capable, and more excited to row.
